Materials you need

- Cardboard
- Toilet roll tubes
- Tape
- Cat biscuits











Method

- 1. Place a piece of cardboard on a flat surface.
- 2. Stick a small piece of tape at either end of the toilet roll tube.
- 3. Start to build the pyramid by securing the toilet roll tubes with the tape to the cardboard base.
- 4. Continue to build up the pyramid, this time securing the toilet roll tubes to the row below.
- 5. Ensure all the tape is stuck down neatly so that the cat cannot hurt themselves.
- 6. Place the cat biscuits inside the toilet roll tubes.
- 7. Let your cat solve the puzzle! (At first you may need to show your cat the answer to avoid frustration).
